See the historic neighborhood where Dr. King was born, preached, and is buried

3:30 pm Meet with Fair Fight 2020

Learn about the work being done to fight modern voter suppression

Dinner in Atlanta

Switch to Central Time when crossing Alabama State line

Evening Depart for Montgomery

DAY TWO: MONTGOMERY

10:30 am Meet Etgar Staff at the Rosa Parks Statue

Hear the story of the events leading up to the Montgomery Bus Boycott at the location

where Rosa Parks got on the historic bus ride. Tour downtown Montgomery.

11:00 am Rosa Parks Museum

learn about the birth of the Civil Rights Movement at the spot where Rosa Parks was

arrested

11:45 am Lunch

1:30 pm Memorial to Peace and Justice: The Lynching Memorial

Reflect on an often-overlooked tragedy at the first memorial for victims of lynching.

3 pm Outside of EJI's Legacy Museum

Explore the evolution of oppression from slavery to mass incarceration and the creation

of a narrative of racial difference.

4 pm Southern Poverty Law Center Civil Rights Memorial 4:30 pm Evening on your own in downtown Montgomery

DAY THREE: SELMA & BIRMINGHAM

8:00 am Depart for Selma

9:00 am Meet at Historic Brown Chapel Church

Hear the story of Jimmy Lee Jackson, why and how the movement came to Selma, and

Bloody Sunday.

9:30 am Visit James Reeb Memorial

Hear the rest of the Selma story that culminates in the successful march to Montgomery.

Learn about the murder of a young white preacher, and how Selma's white population

responded.

10:00 am Walk across the Edmund Pettus Bridge and Visit Memorial Park

10:30 am Depart for Birmingham and lunch

1:30 pm Walking tour of Freedom Park and 16th Street Baptist Church

Meet with Bishop Woods who was a Civil Rights worker in Birmingham in the 50s & 60s and was arrested and had the dogs & hoses turned on him. See the historic church and hear about the tragic day that 4 girls died in a bombing. Tour the park and see the statues that tell the story of the Birmingham Civil Rights movement
